<u>My Self- Image</u>	
Children will explore their awareness of their own self-image and how their body image fits into that. They will explore self-esteem and the positive ways in which they can impact upon this.

<u>Puberty</u>		
Children will reflect upon what they already know about the changes for boys and girls during puberty, both physically and emotionally. They will have safe and secure opportunities to discuss how they feel about these changes

<u>Babies: Conception to Birth</u>		
Children will learn about what happens to a baby as it develops from conception, through nine months of pregnancy and how it is born.

Boyfriends and Girlfriends

Children will begin to explore what it means to be physically attracted to someone and how that may change the nature of the relationship. They will reflect upon what this might mean about having a boyfriend or girlfriend. As part of this learning, children will understand that respect for one another is essential and that personal boundaries are important. Children will learn about keeping themselves safe online in the context of relationships.

Real Self and Ideal Self
